To amend Article V of the State Constitution by adding there to an additional section empowering the Legislature to create, establish and define the jurisdiction and powers of juvenile courts and of the officers thereof; to vest in such courts exclusive original jurisdiction of all criminal cases involving such courts exclusive original jurisdiction of all criminal cases involving such accused minors under any age specified by the Legislature, including the right to define offenses as acts of delinquency instead of crime; to provide for the qualification, election or selection and appointment, compensation and term of office of judges, probation officers and other officers and employees of said courts; all in such mammer, for such time and according to such methods as the Legislature may prescribe and determine without being limited therein by certain existing provisions in the Declaration of Rights or other sections of the State constitution.
