Voter Responsibilities

Each registered voter in this state should:

- 1. Familiarize himself or herself with the candidates and issues.
- Maintain with the office of the Supervisor of Elections a current address.
- 3. Know the location of his or her polling place and its hours of operation.
- 4. Bring proper identification to the polling station.
- 5. Familiarize himself or herself with the operation of the voting equipment in his or her precinct.
- 6. Treat precinct workers with courtesy.
- 7. Respect the privacy of other voters.
- 8. Report any problems or violations of election laws to the supervisor of elections.
- 9. Ask questions, if needed.
- 10. Make sure that his or her completed ballot is correct before leaving the polling station.

NOTE

Failure to perform any of these responsibilities does not prohibit a voter from voting.

Voter's Bill of Rights

Each registered voter in this state has the right to:

- 1. Vote and have his or her vote accurately counted.
- 2. Cast a vote if he or she is in line at the official closing of the polls in that county.
- 3. Ask for and receive assistance in voting.
- 4. Receive up to two replacement ballots if he or she makes a mistake prior to the ballot being cast.
- 5. An explanation if his or her registration or identity is in question.
- 6. If his or her registration or identity is in question, cast a provisional ballot.
- 7. Written instructions to use when voting, and, upon request, oral instructions in voting from elections officers.
- 8. Vote free from coercion or intimidation by elections officers or any other person.
- 9. Vote on a voting system that is in working condition and that will allow votes to be accurately cast.



HOW TO REGISTER

- Complete all required blocks (per instructions) on the Florida Voter Registration Application.
- Applications are available at the elections offices, public assistance offices, libraries, Department of Motor Vehicles, or a printable version may be obtained through our website www.KeysElections.org.
- Those with a FL Driver's License or FL ID card may register online. www.KeysElections.org

REGISTER BY MAIL

- Applications may be mailed or delivered to the Supervisor of Elections Office at least 29 days before each election.
- If you are registering for the first time in Florida and are mailing your application, you must submit a copy of a valid and current Florida I.D., unless one of the following exemptions apply:
- You are 65 years or older.
- You have a permanent or temporary disability.
- You are active duty military or Merchant
 Marine and are absent from the county on
 Election Day or are a spouse or a dependent
 of a member of the armed services or
 Merchant Marine and absent from the county
 on Election Day.

CHANGES IN YOUR REGISTRATION

- It is the responsibility of the voter to keep his or her address current with the Supervisor of Elections Office. If you move to another state, you must register with that state.
- Be sure to notify the Supervisor of Elections Office of name change, an address change, or if you would like to change your party affiliation.
- It is critical to keep your signature updated. If your current signature does not match the signature on file, your vote by mail ballot(s) and/or petition(s) will be rejected.

WHERE TO VOTE

Your polling location is listed on your Voter Information Card or may be obtained through our website at www.KeysElections.org.

POLLING PLACES

- Polling places open at 7:00 a.m. and remain open until everyone in line to vote by 7:00 p.m. has voted.
- You must vote in the precinct where you live.
- Precinct location updates are mailed to you on a Voter Information Card.

PHOTO & SIGNATURE IDENTIFICATION

- You are required to present photo & signature I.D. before voting.
- If the picture identification does not contain the signature of the elector, an additional identification that provides the elector's signature shall be required. If you do not have photo & signature identification, you will be required to vote by provisional process.
- Your Voter Information Card is not acceptable identification for voting purposes.

APPROVED I.D. (F.S. 101.043)

- Florida Driver's License
- Florida I.D. card issued by the DHSMV
- U.S. Passport
- Debit or Credit Card
- Military I.D.
- Student I.D.
- Retirement Center I.D.
- Neighborhood Association I.D.
- Public Assistance I.D.
- Veteran health ID card issued by the US Depart. of Veterans Affairs
- License to carry a concealed weapon or firearm issued pursuant to s. 790.06
- Employee ID card issued by any branch, department, agency, or entity of the Federal Government, the state, a county, or a municipality.

TO REQUEST A VOTE BY MAIL BALLOT

- A vote by mail ballot may be requested for a specific election or for all elections through the next 2 regularly scheduled general elections.
- The request may be made in person, by mail, by telephone, by e-mail or on the elections office web site at www.KeysElections.org. a designated immediate family member or legal guardian may request a vote by mail ballot for the voter.
- Immediate family means the spouse, parent, child, grandparent, grandchild, or sibling of the voter or the voter's spouse.
- A request for a vote by mail ballot to be mailed must be received by this office at least <u>6 days</u> prior to the election.
- A request for a vote by mail ballot must include the name of the voter, the voter's address, the voter's date of birth, and the voter's signature (written requests only).
- If vote by mail ballot is being mailed to an address which is different than the address on file request must be in writing and signed.
- If the voter has designated an immediate family member to request the ballot for him or her, the designee must also provide his or her own name, address, relationship to the voter, state issued ID, such as a Driver's License, and signature (written requests only).
- Vote by mail ballots <u>must</u> be returned to the Supervisor of Elections Office no later than 7:00 p.m. on Election Day in person or by mail.

IMPORTANT

You must update any address changes with this office. Vote by mail ballots <u>cannot</u> be forwarded. If they are returned as undeliverable, all subsequent requests will be cancelled.

TABULATORS

Each precinct will consist of two tabulators.

HOW TO VOTE

After the ballot is marked, the voter feeds paper ballot into the tabulator which reads and tabulates the ballot. Below is an example of how to correctly mark the ballot.

ACCESSIBLE VOTING

Easy As One, Two, Three

- ① Voter inserts paper ballot into the tabulating system.
- ② Voter makes selection using tabulator accessories.
- 3 Voter casts the ballot.

CLOSED PRIMARY

- Florida is a closed primary state.
- In the Primary Election, you will be able to vote only for the candidates whose party affiliation is the same as yours and for non-partisan races. Non-partisan voters vote on issues and non-partisan candidates.
- If a partisan race will be decided in the primary, everyone will vote in that race. This is known as a "Universal Primary Contest."
